

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

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
A Beautiful Tribute to Yogananda in 1952

In 1952, at the time of Paramahansa Yogananda's *mahasamadhi*, Dr. Evans-Wentz wrote to SRF the following tribute:

"For all future time, Paramahansa Yogananda, now no longer incarnate among us, will be regarded as one of India's greatest ambassadors of the higher culture to the New World. The numerous centers of Self-Realization Fellowship . . .are self-evident proof of the remarkable success of his mission on earth. It is now the mighty privelege of all those yet in incaration who venerate Paramahansa Yogananda as their Guide and Teacher to carry forward, and to transmit to the next generation, the saving teachings that he entrusted to them. About a year ago Dr. Evans-Wentz, who had resided for a long time in San Diego, California, expressed a wish to live in Encinitas at the Self-Realization Colony. He came to Encinitas and lived there until his death. Bramachari Lou, a resident SRF disciple in the colony, served as the scholar's secretary and daily companion. Dr. Evans-Wentz took a tremendous interest in Self-Realization Fellowship and all it's activities. He revered the line of SRF Gurus and often joined Brahmachari Lou, particularly to Mahavatar Babaji.

The distinguished writer kept up his literary work until the end of his life. He recently completed the manuscript of his last book, Sacred Mountains of the World. Included in it are chapters on the Himalayas and other mountains of India, and on mountains in the U.S.A. that are considered holy by the American Indians...

Recently the great scholar made a donation to Yogoda Satsanga Soceity (founded in India by Paramahansa Yogananda) of some valuable property in Puri–the ancient pilgrimage city in which Sri Yukteswar's body is buried.



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
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[*Read this section from the last page of the article posted below*] And now these words of Lord Buddha:

Dr. Walter Y. Evans-Wentz, 87, internationally known authority on comparative religion, died on July 17th in Encinitas, California. He was born in Trenton, New Jersey, on February 2, 1878. He received B.A. and M.A. degrees from Stanford University, California, in 1906 and 1907; a degree of Docteur ès lettres from University of Rennes in France, in 1909; and a B.Sc. degree from Oxford University, England, in 1910. In 1931 Oxford University conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Science in Comparative Religion; he was the first American to receive this degree.

He traveled to Tibet in 1919 and became a Buddhist monk. Among his many writings, perhaps the most famous are The Tibetan Book of the Dead; The Tibetan Book of the Great Liberation; Tibetan Yoga and Secret Doctrines, and Tibet's Great Yogi Milarepa (all published by Oxford University Press).

"It has been my privilege to meet one of the sages whose life history is herein narrated — Sri Yukteswar Giri. A likeness of the venerable saint appeared as part of the frontispicce of my *Tibetan Yoga and Secret Doctrines*. It was in Puri, in Orissa, on the Bay of Bengal, that I encountered Sri Yukteswar. He was then the head of a quiet ashram near the seashore there, and was chiefly occupied in the spiritual training of a group of youthful disciples. He was of gentle mien and voice, of pleasing presence, and worthy of the veneration that his followers spontaneously accorded to him. Every person who knew him, whether of his own community or not, held him in the highest esteem....

"I am glad, indeed, to be able to record this testimony to the high character and holiness of Sri Yukteswar. Content to remain afar from the multitude, he gave himself unreservedly and in tranquillity to that ideal life which Paramahansa Yogananda, his disciple, has now described for the ages."

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an Book of the Dead. It is customary in Tibet for this passage to be read after the death of the body:

"Reverend Sir, now that thou art experiencing the Fundamental Clear Light, try to abide in that state which now thou art experiencing. O Noblyborn, Dr. Walter Y. Evans-Wentz, listen. Now thou art experiencing the Radiance of the Clear Light of Pure Reality. Recognize it. O Nobly-born, thy present intellect, in its real nature void, not formed into anything as regards characteristics or color, naturally void, is the very Reality, the All-Good.

"Thine own intellect, which is now voidness, yet not to be regarded as of the voidness of nothingness, but as being the intellect itself, unobstructed, shining, thrilling, and blissful, is the very consciousness, the All-good Buddha. Thine own consciousness, not formed into anything, in reality void, and the intellect, shining and blissful — these two are inseparable. The union of them is the state of Perfect Enlightenment.

"Thine own consciousness, shining, void, and inseparable from the Great Body of Radiance, hath no birth, nor death, and is the Immutable Light. Knowing this is sufficient. Recognizing the voidness of thine own intellect to be Buddhahood, and looking upon it as being thine own consciousness, is to keep thyself in the state of the divine mind of the Buddha."
